Revision Card – Present and Past Tense

Verbs

Verbs indicate that someone or something is doing, feeling or being.

<u>They built a ship.</u> <u>Tom fell.</u> <u>I played and played.</u> The stairs were a mess!

Usually verbs have the name of a person or thing or a pronoun in front of them. These are underlined here.

Verbs have a tense.

They tell us *when* the action happened.

In the past,

In the present,

or, in the future.



Tom played.

We have such fun.

We will play again tomorrow.

Verbs have a **tense**.

They tell us *when* the action happened.

The boys <i>play</i> .	The boys <i>played</i> .
Tom <i>falls</i> on the stairs.	Tom <i>fell</i> on the stairs.
I am a bit sad.	I was a bit sad.
You <i>tell</i> me not to worry.	You <i>told</i> me not to worry.
