Remember to present your work as neatly as possible.

Join your writing and make sure it is legible.

Punctuation Reminders:

- A Capital letters for sentences, initials and proper nouns. *Worthing*
- . Full stops
- ! Exclamation marks for surprise or exclamations. *Wow!*
- ? Question marks. Can I go?
- ' Apostrophes for possession (*Henry's*) and missing letters (*didn't*).
- , Commas in lists.
- " " Inverted commas for speech (Don't forget the commas too) "That cat is a menace," yelled Dad.

Get Descriptive!

Don't forget to use expanded noun phrases:

The hideous, fire-breathing

dragon with green scales.

Paragraphing:

You need to be organising your writing into paragraphs as much as possible. Just make sure each one is about the same theme.

Homophones

Don't muddle your homophones:

there/their/they're your/you're our/are whether/weather

Super Suffixes!

-tion: preparation, sensation-ous: curious, outrageous-ly: gently, frantically

More writing tips:


Use a thesaurus or 'Write like a Ninja' books to develop your vocabulary choices.

Use pronouns like he, she, them or they instead of repeating a name or names.

Use fronted adverbials with a comma.

e.g. After the storm, Running for his life, Before lunch, As the sun set,
